Location and Geography of Mount Kangchenjunga

Kangchenjunga is located in the eastern Himalayas, straddling the border between Nepal and India. The mountain's main peak lies in Nepal's Taplejung District, while its southern slopes extend into India's Sikkim state.

Kangchenjunga is part of the Singalila Range, a sub-range of the Himalayas that stretches from eastern Nepal to western Bhutan. The mountain's massif is massive, encompassing an area of approximately 1,200 square kilometers (463 square miles). It is surrounded by a network of glaciers, including the Zemu Glacier, the Yalung Glacier, and the Kangchenjunga Glacier.

Kangchenjunga is composed of rocks that range in age from Neoproterozoic (late Precambrian) to Ordovician (about 445 million to 1 billion years old). These rocks were formed during the collision of two tectonic plates, resulting in the uplift of the Himalayas. The mountain's steep slopes and high elevation are a testament to the immense forces that shaped its formation.

Kangchenjunga Himal Section:

The Kangchenjunga Himal section of the Himalayas is a significant geological feature, encompassing 16 peaks over 7,000 meters (23,000 feet) in height. It is bounded by the Lhonak Chu, Goma Chu, and Jongsang La rivers in the north, and by the Teesta River in the east. The western limit runs from the Jongsang La down the Gingsang and Kangchenjunga glaciers and the rivers of Ghunsa and Tamur.
